the 68th Annual National Lectureship hosted by the Newburg Church of Christ in the city of Louisville, Kentucky, was indeed a complete success in every imaginable way. Ministers, elders, deacons, and Christians from all across the country convened at the Hyatt Regency Downtown in Louisville, Kentucky, during the dates of April 3-8, 2012, to witness unparalleled history in the making. For the first time in National Lectureship history, the host congregation presented a program format whereby one speaker was selected to give the final homily each evening at the close of services.

According to Brother Kenneth E. Fleming, host Minister of the Newburg Church of Christ "This was the greatest event that has ever occurred among the congregations in Louisville"

At the request of the host congregation, Dr. W. F. Washington of Fort Lauderdale, Florida, presented a series of challenging messages which captivated and motivated those who were in attendance. According to Brother Kenneth E. Fleming, host Minister of the Newburg Church of Christ "This was the greatest event that has ever occurred among the congregations in Louisville." Dr. Washington spoke to the needs of the Church in the 21st century in addition to those who know not the Lord Jesus in the pardoning of their sins.

Dr. R. C. Wells, Chairman of the National Lectureship and Minister Emeritus of the Harlem Church of Christ in New York City, reminded the attendees in his "Purpose of the Lectureship" statement that our objective was and continues to be an irrefutable desire to "speak the same thing" and there

should be "no divisions among us." Also, presented for the first time at the National Lectureship was a small scale collection of pictures and biographies relative to African American preachers in the Church of Christ. He also provided a tour for those present discussing the many treasured artifacts he has in possession.

For the first time in National Lectureship history, the host congregation presented a program format whereby one speaker was selected to give the final homily each evening at the close of services.

The final attendance total for the 2012 Louisville National Lectureship was estimated to be nearly 1700; not including approximately 800 who were present for the "Lectureship Regional Singing" on Saturday afternoon and those who attended the National Lectureship Banquet held on Saturday evening.

A Brief History of the Annual National Lectureship Among African American Churches of Christ

The Annual National Lectureship among African American Churches of Christ was first suggested by the late R. N. Hogan in 1942, during his ministry with the Stonewall and Waco Street Church of Christ in Houston, Texas. The agenda of this meeting was to discuss the need of a National Lectureship among the African American Church of Christ similar to that of the white brethren.

Hogan believed that a National Lectureship would help synchronize both the preaching and teaching of New Testament doctrine and foster a means of fellowship for preachers who would attend. G. E. Steward, in addition to Levi Kennedy, Jr., and J. S. Winston, each agreed with the concept that a Lectureship of this nature would serve a great need in our brotherhood

In the year of 1944 at the Bowser Christian Institute school meeting in Fort Smith, Arkansas, Steward suggested they should begin to make plans for the Lectureship which had been discussed in Houston, Texas, two years earlier.

G. P. Bowser was inspired by this idea and he also agreed there was a need for such an event.

G. P. Bowser was inspired by this idea and he also agreed there was a need for such an event. Bowser encouraged them to make arrangements for sponsoring a Lectureship the following year. Subsequently, in 1945, the first ever Annual National Lectureship was held in the city of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, with the East Seventh Street congregation serving as the host. G. E. Steward served as Ministering Evangelist of this congregation.

To fully comprehend the purpose of the Lectureship, one must understand the dynamics and rationale for which it was conceived. In the decade of the forties, very few Ministers in our fellowship were able to maintain local congregations and evangelize new areas. In many instances, new congregations would be established following gospel meetings without a leadership structure to sustain them. Therefore, the fundamental objective of the Lectureship was to resolve this situation by providing the following initiatives:

- To help synchronize and unify the speech of gospel preachers and church leaders.
- To enhance spiritual fellowship in the areas

of Bible study and worship through the medium of joint participation.

- To teach sound biblical doctrine against the tenets of liberalism, digression, and apos-
- To encourage and strengthen the work of congregations in whose area the Lectureship would be held.
- The Lectureship is never to become an organization with authority to legislate laws and rules to be bound on local congregations.
- The Lectureship is never to become a delegated convention, with men of local congregations who would have voice in policymaking decisions that would be binding upon churches. All local churches of Christ are autonomous in government and they are subject to Christ
- The Lectureship is never to become a vehicle for settling church confusion and division. Church problems and conflict are the responsibility of the local congregations and can only be mediated and resolved with the local congregation

The dates of the first Lectureship among African American Churches of Christ were March 22-24, 1945, with a total of thirty-six (36) Ministers in attendance. Due to the tremendous success of the Lectureship encounter, it was recommended that it should be held every year. This suggestion was unanimously agreed upon by those present and it has been held annually since that time.

In the year 1948, the Annual National Lectureship was held in Chicago, Illinois and hosted by the Michigan Avenue Church of Christ where Levi Kennedy, Jr., served as Minister. At the behest of J. S. Winston, a registration fee of \$7.00 was required for out of town attendees to help defer expenses. During the Chicago gathering, it was agreed that the Ministers who actually began the Lectureship would serve as advisors to congregations who would host the Lectureship in future years.

It was further agreed that both Levi Kennedy, Jr., and J. S. Winston would assist hosting congregations in making necessary preparations. Levi Kennedy, Jr., was appointed as Chairman of the Lectureship, visiting with all the congregations who served as host and assisting them with their program until his illness in 1969. After the death of Kennedy on December 30, 1970, G. P. Holt was selected as the new Chairman and served in this capacity until 1975. A. C. Christman, Sr., succeeded Holt and served as Chairman until 1988. In the year 1988 at the Lecture-

ship held in St. Louis, Missouri, Dr. Clyde proven to be helpful in a variety of different Muse was appointed as Chairman and served as such until his passing in the year 2007. position as Chairman of the Annual National Lectureship Advisory Committee.

The Advisory Committee of the National Lectureship has increased with Ministers from various sections of the brotherhood. During the Annual Lectureship gathering, this Committee meets and consults with Ministers and church leaders who request for the Lectureship to be hosted in their city. The Committee also assists the host congregation with any on-site assistance and direction during the event itself.

In the year 1970, the National Lectureship was hosted by the D'Antignac Church of Christ in Augusta, Georgia, where Richard Williams served as Ministering Evangelist. This was the first Lectureship experience where hotel accommodations and services were utilized. This visionary strategy was afforded by Dr. Andrew Hairston, Ministering Evangelist of the Simpson Street Church of Christ in Atlanta, Georgia, and it has obviously proven itself necessary in regards to massive convocations of

In the year 1971, the National Lectureship was hosted by the University Church of Christ in Cleveland, Ohio where J. S. Winston served as Ministering Evangelist. This was the first Lectureship experience where study cell workshops were featured as an integral component of the Lectureship format. Workshops discussing different aspects of congregational leadership such as the eldership and deacons have been emphasized in these settings.

In addition, study cells and workshops pertinent to the role of women in the church, teacher preparation, effective youth ministries, church growth, biblical interpretation, information technology, evangelism and soul winning, have now become important features of the Annual National Lectureship. Furthermore, a separate Ladies Program and Luncheon have been incorporated into the framework of the National Lectureship.


In the year 1973, G. E. Steward suggested that area congregations should consider hosting local, state, and regional Lectureships. It was Steward's belief this practice would give an opportunity for more congregations to attend and participate. As a consequence, many states and regions throughout the brotherhood today have local lectureships and they have

In 1974 at the National Lectureship in Lou-Presently, Dr. R. C. Wells has assumed the isville, Kentucky, Steward again suggested that since the Annual National Lectureship had become quite costly in matters of economics, each state should conduct its own Lectureship and the National Lectureship should be discontinued. However, it was the consensus of Ministers and church leaders in attendance that the National Lectureship should continue because of the many distinct attributes it affords; such as national acquaintances and fellowship that would not otherwise be realized.

In the year 1979, John O. Williams who then served as Ministering Evangelist of the Central Church of Christ in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, conceived the idea of having an Annual Banquet in concert with the National Lectureship. The objective of this banquet is to celebrate and honor the memory of deceased African American Church of Christ Ministers who have made significant contributions for the cause of Christ. In an effort to continue the idea of the late John Oscar Williams, a set of plaques have been developed on which the names of all deceased African American Ministers of the Church of Christ are inscribed. In 1988, at the 44th Annual National Lectureship held in St. Louis, Missouri, the plaques made their initial debut and have been displayed at every Annual National Lectureship since that time.

According to available statistics, the ministerial attendance for the Annual National Lectureship held among African American Churches of Christ has substantially increased from thirty-six (36) in 1945, to well over twohundred. The total average attendance for all participants of the Lectureship has grown to approximately twenty-five hundred (2500) [contingent upon proximity], with representation from Jamaica, Bermuda, the Bahamas, and Nigeria, West Africa.

In Remembrance of the Late Evangelist Paul Silas Settles Former Minister of the Settegast Church of Christ – Houston, Texas



Paul Silas Settles Settegast Church of Christ 1908-1969

Paul Silas Settles was born May 11, 1908. in Shelby County, Cordova, Tennessee, to the parents of Cornelius and Mariah Bowles Settles. He was baptized into the body of Christ in the year 1939 under the preaching influence of G. E. Steward. Known for his vast literary accomplishments in addition to his oratorical excellence, Paul S. Settles became one of the most proficient proclaimers of truth among African-American churches of Christ.

His manner of dress was always impeccable, which mirrored his philosophy that God's representative should be reflective of whom he serves. Countless numbers were brought to Christ across the country as a result of the dynamic and provocative preaching style of Evangelist Paul S. Settles. Having served the Settegast congregation (North Wayside Church of Christ) in Houston, Texas, for a number of years, Paul S. Settles passed away from this life on August 11, 1969.

Although he is "absent from the body" the work of Paul Settles continues to live on. As a staunch defender of the faith and supporter of Christian education, his lifelong contributions to the visible kingdom are still ever

Man is forever seeking the answers to great and vital questions. Sometimes he seeks answers from within and sometimes he seeks answers from others. Sometimes man seeks answers from existing circumstances around him. But any of the previously named sources from which man seeks to find answers, they are often deficient and very shallow.

There is but one place to find the answer, namely, Christ of the Bible.

We must remember the words of Jeremiah "Man cannot direct his own steps" (Jeremiah 10:23). Hence, man is in need of a guide. As a plumbline according to Amos 7:8, Christ our standard and our rule. All things must be judged by Christ as the standard.

As a ruler according to Micah 5:2 and Matthew 2:6, Christ is a Governor that shall rule the people of God. Furthermore, as a ruler, Christ has been given all authority and power in heaven and in earth (Matthew 28:18). Christ is the one who satisfies the needs and desires of mankind. He not only satisfies the needs of man, but on the cross Christ opened a fountain for the removal of all uncleanness (Zechariah 13:1). Was an ordinary man who lived an extraordinary life. A former enslaved African American from Virginia, Cassius was the product of a biracial union, a house-slave, Jane, and probably his phy-

sician and politician owner, James W. F. Macrae, a relative of General Robert E. Lee.

During the Civil War, Cassius and his mother relocated to Washington, D. C., where he worked as a "contraband" and enrolled in the first school for African American children in the nation's capital.

In this school, young Samuel encountered a white school teacher from Connecticut, Frances W. Perkins, who whetted his appetite for knowledge, steered him toward the ministry, and inspired to teach in his adult years. While residing in the Washington, D. C.,

Cassius also "shook hands" with President Abraham Lincoln, Frederick Douglass, and a host of other white and black digni-

Camuel Robert Cassius in Washington, D.C. in 1874. In the early 1880s the family relocated to Brazil, Indiana, where he toiled as a coal-miner and where he converted to the Churches of Christ, a religion tracing its American origins to Barton W. Stone and Alexander Campbell, variously known as the Stone-Campbell Movement or Restoration Movement.

> In 1891 Cassius, driven by a religious impulse as well as a desire for economic advancement, took up residence in the Oklahoma Territory where he lived until 1922. In Oklahoma he worked as a preacher, educator, farmer, entrepreneur, postmaster, and politician. Cassius fathered eleven children with his first Effie (who died in 1895) and twelve with his second wife, Selina Daisy Flenoid, who he married in 1898.

In 1920 Cassius published The Third Birth of a Nation, a response to and denunciation of Thomas Dixon's 1905 racist novel The Clansman and D. W. Griffith's 1915 inflammatory movie, "Birth of a Nation." Cassius reissued his book in 1925. taries. Cassius married Effie Festus-Basil From 1922 until 1925, Cassius lived and

preached temporarily in Ohio, Illinois, Minnesota, and California, before settling in 1926 in Colorado Springs, Colorado, where his eventful life ended on August 10, 1931.

Because he consistently incorporated social and racial issues into his religious writings, Cassius often found himself at odds with whites in the Stone-Campbell Movement, the very people he relied on for monetary support. He advocated a Booker T. Washington-style self-help ethos while at the same time firmly resisting racism wherever he encountered it. Largely invisible in a world dominated by such towering figures as Washington, Frederick Douglass, Ida B. Wells, and W. E. B. DuBois, Cassius lived a life of virtual obscurity beyond the circle of the Stone-Campbell Movement. His story is important because, as a racial militant and separatist, he presaged the schism that would engulf and fracture the Churches of Christ in the 1960s, when blacks and whites went their separate ways and formed two distinct groups in one religious fellowship.

By combing through a plethora of primary

sources that Cassius left behind in both religious and nonreligious journals, Edward J. Robinson has successfully reconstructed and recaptured the essence of Cassius' complex and extraordinary life. This book offers the first full-length study of a man of remarkable attainment despite daily obstacles and resistance.

Hillcrest Church of Christ Receives Million Dollar Surprise

The Hillcrest Church of Christ located in Church. The most ambitious goal of the con-The Hillcrest Church of Child Legal Decatur, Georgia, where Dr. Richard L. Barclay serves as Evangelist, has continued to experience the favor of God despite the recent loss of one of its leaders. Following the sudden and shocking death of Elder Donald A. Perry on July 27, 2012, the congregation had very little to lift the dark veil of sadness and sorrow from their memory. But Chick-fil-A, Brother Perry's employer for thirty years, has done their best to renew their spirits.

The company did it by embracing a cause close to the heart of Brother Perry and his widow Marilyn, with contributions totaling \$1 million dollars. The announcement made by officials on Sunday, September 9, 2012, at the morning service was simply breathtaking. The gift, announced by Donald "Bubba" Cathy, Senior Vice President of the company, assured the success of the \$5.2 million dollar Church project that includes a 1300 seat sanctuary, a new administrative wing for the education program, conference rooms, and a state-of-the art nursery.

"Marilyn Perry affirmed her hope that contributions would go to the Hillcrest building fund, and we will honor those wishes," said Barclay, Senior Minister of the Hillcrest

gregation was to raise \$2 million. As a result, this timely gift put the Church on the brink of success. Construction of this massive project already underway is expected to be completed in a year. It will be the biggest expansion since the congregation was established in 1945.

Marilyn Perry thanked Chick-fil-A at a ceremony and expressed hope that the gift would be a unifying force behind the Lord's work. "Let us all come together, even former members who have moved away because we have work to do in this community" she said. "Let us keep faith with Don - he really loved this Church."

Don Perry, who left his wife and three adult sons, was a leader both at the Hillcrest congregation and in his profession. He joined Chick fil A as a communications specialist in 1983, and rose to become Vice President of Corporate Public Relations and chief spokesman for the \$4 billion company. He guided a program that saw the company expand from an Atlanta-based regional company to a powerful national brand.

Don, who grew up on his father's farm in South Georgia, milking cows before school, went on to become one of the first African Americans to succeed in the communications program at the University of Georgia. Earlier this year Don was asked how a country boy came to become a communications pioneer. He said he observed how his father with only a grade school education emerged as a community leader. "I went off to Georgia to learn how to do that even better" he said. And he did. Recently he was voted as one of the top 50 graduates in communications at Georgia.

For all his business success, his most challenging and most satisfying work was in the Church. When asked to reflect upon his work as an elder he stated: "I'm still learning. But the consuming challenge is to try to keep brothers and sisters on the same page, pulling together for Christ in an environment that is so diverse in so many different ways. The Church represents vastly different age groups with widely differing economic levels and life experiences. On top of that, we serve a transient fellowship with many





coming and going. Management of personalities is a major part of a Church leader's job. 
