Ministers' Institute Conference to Undergo Name Change "W. F. Washington Theological Institute"

t the annual Advisory Committee meeting held on June 6, 2017, Dr. Harvey M. Jackson, who serves as National Coordinator of the Ministers' Institute Conference (MIC), announced that the Conference will undergo a name change beginning in the year 2018.

According to Dr. Jackson, it was unanimously decided by those who attend the MIC that the name should be changed to reflect the legacy of its founder. With this in mind, the name of the MIC will now be called the "W. F. Washington Theological Institute."

Each year during the month of January, men and women of God throughout the brotherhood assemble in Fort Lauderdale, to participate in this annual event. The Institute has proven itself to be an indispensable resource for preachers, church leaders and students of the Scripture.

However, it is essentially imperative that the perpetual legacy of Dr. W. F. Washington be embraced and preserved for generations that will follow.

Many young preachers in the African American Church of Christ today are unfamiliar with the contributions made by pioneers such as R. N. Hogan, Levi Kennedy, Jr., J. S. Winston, G. P. Holt, and G. E. Steward.

We have no institutions of learning bearing the names of

these men who blazed the trail of our theological experiences. Freed-Hardeman University in Henderson, Tennessee, is aptly named after A. G. Freed and N. B. Hardeman.

According to Dr. Jackson, it was unanimously decided by those who attend the MIC that the name should be changed to reflect the legacy of its founder.

David Lipscomb University in Nashville, Tennessee, derives its name from David Lipscomb. Pepperdine University located in Malibu, California, is named after George Pepperdine. Also, Harding University in Searcy, Arkansas, and Memphis, Tennessee, received its name from James A. Harding.

We have no institutions of learning bearing the names of these men who blazed the trail of our theological experiences.

Consequently, we believe it is appropriate to rename the Ministers' Institute Conference to the "W. F. Washington Theological Institute" in recognition of its legendary founder.




Purpose and Objective


The Institute has proven itself to be an indispensable resource for preachers, church leaders and students of the Scripture.
